It was a year of regeneration for Westpac Scholars Trust and our scholars.

A return to the delivery of face-to-face events and international travel was a breath of fresh air and really revitalised our sense of community. Our scholars began to reconnect, coming together with renewed enthusiasm for events like the Scholars Summit, numerous Leadership Residentials and the inaugural Disruptive Leaders Program for our Young Technologists cohort.

For Westpac Scholars Trust, this was the first time in three years that events of this magnitude had been delivered in person, with most activities bigger than ever as cohorts from 2020, 2021 and 2022 were brought together.

The pandemic has been a difficult and challenging time for our scholars and university partners, but the resilience that has been demonstrated is truly remarkable with many scholars making significant inroads to their studies and research during this time.

What has been particularly heart-warming is the connections that have been made due to the Westpac 100 Scholars Network (W100). Many of our scholars have come together to form new professional relationships, be it through mentorship or project collaboration – a theme which we explore in a number of feature stories throughout this report.

Seeing our vision for the W100 Network come together in such a tangible way is a true testament to the program, and I'm excited for what the future holds as we continue striving to create a stronger Australia, together.

Over the past seven years of the program, we have connected more than 640 scholars through the W100 and have awarded more than \$35 million in funding. This year we introduced *Sustainable Futures* as a new focus area across all our scholarship streams, formalising our commitment to supporting innovative solutions to reduce the environmental impacts of climate change.

2022 also saw Westpac Scholars Trust inaugural CEO Susan Bannigan step down and retire from corporate life. A brilliant strategist and full of curiosity, Susan helped pioneer our scholarship program. We were privileged to have worked with her and to be the guardians of her legacy, and we thank her for her tireless work.

Westpac Research Fellowship

Working with some of Australia's leading research universities, we invest in the brightest, most innovative early career researchers. Not just to enable them to do their best work, but to actively help them influence positive change.

We awarded **2 Westpac Research Fellowships** valued at **\$993,911** (including **\$333,911** co-funding from the University of Melbourne and the University of Sydney collectively).



Westpac Future Leaders Scholarship

With a focus on leadership development, the Future Leaders Scholarship was designed in partnership with Australia's leading universities to be a life-changing experience. We invest up to \$120,000 in scholars' postgraduate studies and leadership development experiences.

We awarded 17 Westpac Future Leaders Scholarships valued at \$2,026,302.



Westpac Social Change Fellowship

A social innovation program focused on the growth and development of extraordinary individuals leading social change in Australia. The fellowship is tailored to the needs of the individual to help them grow as a leader, with a bespoke personal development plan and leadership course.

We awarded 10 Westpac Social Change Fellowships valued at \$499,870.



Westpac Asian Exchange Scholarship

We offer scholars an international experience to help develop their cross-cultural thinking and provide them access to networking opportunities with Australia-Asia thought leaders. An immersive experience helps to forge meaningful relationships between the next generation of young Australian and Asian leaders.

We awarded **37 Westpac Asian Exchange Scholarships** valued at **\$453,250.**



Westpac Young Technologists Scholarship

Young Technologists Scholarships are designed for high school graduates who are passionate about technology and eager to explore its potential for good. With a newly established Disruptive Leaders Program, this scholarship provides new networking and growth opportunities for young innovators.

We awarded **34 Westpac Young Technologists Scholarships** valued at **\$680,000**.

The W100 is the alumni program to which all Westpac Scholars become lifelong members. It's an inspiring network of game-changers, achievers, bright sparks and believers.



OUR FOCUS AREAS









LAUNCH OF SUSTAINABLE FUTURES FOCUS AREA

Westpac Scholars Trust has launched a new focus area to address one of the world's most pressing challenges - climate change.

Aptly named Sustainable Futures, the new focus area applies to all scholarship streams and will enable greater investment in education and research that accelerates innovative solutions to reduce Australia's environmental impact and build a more sustainable future. It joins three other focus areas: Australia in Asia, An Inclusive Country and Thriving Tech Sector.

Not only will the new focus area help Australia respond and adapt to climate change, but it also echoes what scholars care about most, with many existing scholars already pursuing studies in this area.

For example, 2016 Research Fellow Associate Professor Ivan Kassal from the University of Sydney used the scholarship funding to further his research in solar-energy harvesting using quantum effects.

There have been numerous others like Associate Professor Kassal since the Trust's inception, and this year was no different, with both 2022 Westpac Research Fellows receiving a combined \$1 million in funding to support their sustainability research.



Dr Hamish Clarke from the University of Melbourne received \$451,000 to support his research around climate change impacts on the critical drivers of bushfire. Dr Shawna Foo from the University of Sydney received \$542,000 to support her research to understand threats to coral reef existence and to develop effective management strategies in the face of global change.

With the addition of Sustainable Futures as a focus area, the Westpac Scholars Trust will expand its eligibility criteria to encourage even more scholars to undertake studies in this area.



BIO-ENGINEERING A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

Researching in the sustainability space is synthetic chemist, bio-engineer and 2020 Westpac Research Fellow Dr Yu Heng Lau. He and his team at the School of Chemistry at the University of Sydney are exploring new ways to address food scarcity by improving crop yields. To do this, the team are engineering simple versions of a protein structure found in blue-green algae and inserting it into plants to boost growth and increase carbon-capturing efficiency.

While this is long-term research, the potential impact is huge and could mean less land and energy are required to derive increased food supplies, ultimately making the agriculture industry more sustainable.

"If you think about rising populations and the increasing demand on food, and at the same time shrinking amounts of arable land, you can see that productivity is being squeezed on both sides," he says. "Technology like ours is one of the areas where we might be able to help relieve that squeeze."

"We're interested in how living things capture carbon from the air," says Yu Heng. "We know that plants do it to help them grow. What less people realise is that a lot of the world's carbon dioxide gets captured from blue-green algae and other ocean bacteria, and that they have a really clever way of doing it."

Yu Heng and his team are looking at one of the most abundant proteins found on earth, Rubisco, and trying to make it more efficient by housing it within a synthetic protective cage-like structure modelled from blue-green algae, that is simple and self-assembling. They are currently working with plant biologists at the lab of Professor Spencer Whitney at the Australian National University in Canberra to put the engineered proteins into plants.

"Even if you only get a few percent increase in carboncapture efficiency, if it's something that's scalable then it means a lot for sustainability in industries like agriculture," says Yu Heng.

OUR BESPOKE LEADERSHIP PROGRAMS

Westpac Scholars Trust aims to develop world-class leaders by offering bespoke programs to equip our scholars with the skills, confidence and networks to reach their potential. Each scholarship stream has a transformational leadership program that focuses on developing inclusive leaders, who value diversity and have the ability to drive change that positively contributes to Australia.



Disruptive Leaders Program launches

The Disruptive Leaders Program launched for the first time this year for Young Technologists from 2020 and 2021 cohorts. With the addition of this program, all scholar streams now incorporate a bespoke Leadership Residential, making them a truly unique offering for young changemakers.

Supported by Westpac Scholars Trust, Murdoch University and Common Purpose, the Disruptive Leaders Program ran for the three days following the Scholars Summit, enabling scholars to immerse themselves in a full week that catalysed personal development.

The program itinerary focused on three keys areas — communication, connection and confidence. The combination of small group work and whole group formats empowered scholars to feel more confident speaking in public and sharing their opinion in a safe space. As a result, most scholars noted a spike in confidence following the program.¹

Asian Exchange Leadership Residential returns

For the first time since 2019, Westpac Scholars Trust, in partnership with the University of Tasmania, delivered a week-long Leadership Residential to 44 Asian Exchange Scholars in Singapore.

The Residential is designed to foster the development of critical skills for the next generation of Asia-capable leaders, building their own personal brand of leadership, and increasing their confidence and networks.

2022 WESTPAC SCHOLARS SUMMIT

After two years of COVID-19 delays, Westpac Scholars were able to gather together again face to face at the annual Scholars Summit. Held in Sydney across two days in July, more than 200 scholars from 2020, 2021 and 2022 participated in tailored workshops, heard from business and academic luminaries including Dr Jordan Nguyen and Madeleine Buchner OAM, and formed connections with each other.

The event this year was developed by scholars for scholars, with the scholar community involved at every stage, including as MCs and panel members. For some, this provided a unique personal development opportunity and for others it was a chance to learn and grow from peers.

With a return to international travel in 2022, we saw scholars participating in a range of enriching leadership and development opportunities across the globe, including 57 Asian Exchange Scholars who headed to Singapore, Hong Kong, South Korea, Japan and Taiwan.

These international experiences are a vital part of our scholarship programs as they provide unique learning opportunities that challenge and grow our leaders of tomorrow.

GAINING A GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE

Joe Kwon is the Founder and CEO of social enterprise Convict Fitness (ConFit) and not-for-profit Confit Pathways. Both organisations work in tandem to break the cycle of recidivism of young people in Australia by providing opportunities for former inmates as fitness trainers and mentors.

A former inmate himself, Joe served time in prison for directing a criminal enterprise. He's now determined to help others build a positive life outside of prison.

"We use fitness to engage with young people, and because of our own lived experience we connect straight away," says Joe. "We run a fitness program first to help everyone let their guard down. Then, when they're listening, we talk about issues like self-worth, gratitude and the value of employment and education."

After returning home from a month of travel visiting Bergen Prison in Norway and Rikers Island in the USA as part of his Social Change Fellowship, Joe has now been invited by the Department of Youth Justice in Australia to share his experiences and suggest improvements to the prison system. This is an opportunity he attributes to the credibility of being a Westpac Scholar.

"One of the areas we focused on in the Leadership Program was systems change and systems thinking," he says.

"I thought my workmates and I were just a bunch of former inmates doing fitness and using it as a vehicle to resonate with others in prison, but we weren't really thinking about the bigger picture. I never would have expected we could have such big input into changing the justice system in Australia."



CHANGING THE WORLD FOR THE BETTER

Alexandra Proctor is a PhD candidate at the University of Adelaide, where she is undertaking research on intergenerational contact with the welfare system in South Australia and examining subsequent health and child protection outcomes for young people.

One day Alexandra hopes to provide evidence to change the way society views recipients of the welfare system (Centrelink) and challenge conceptions of worthiness. "Ultimately, the evidence should help provide a foundation for how we can reimagine our welfare system from one aimed at supporting adults to one that provides adequate resources to adults who hope to increase life chances for their children," she says.

To further her work in this area, Alexandra used her scholarship funding this year to attend international events on public health in Switzerland, the USA and Scotland.

"It was an intense and brilliant opportunity for shared growth and development," she says. "I had the opportunity to meet colleagues from my research group face-to-face, present my findings to their work and get more in-depth feedback. A couple of years ago, I wouldn't have imagined this as something that I'd be able to do."

Alexandra's experiences overseas have prompted her to reflect upon the potential her work has to do good in the world, and how her emergence as a future leader has been nurtured within the W100 Network.

"Back in 2019, we had a workshop around public speaking and presenting as part of the Leadership Development Program and it completely changed how I thought about putting my work forward," she says.

"It's taken me a long time to recognise that a lot of my growth and development stems from that point, and that the investment in my career by Westpac Scholars Trust has come to fruition in different ways," she says.

"The international events this year have really given me the chance to test myself and reflect back on my growth."

SHARING A PASSION FOR REAL-WORLD IMPACT

"I preferenced Sarah Prime first to be my mentor having never met her before," says Mayleah House, 2021 Future Leader. "On paper, the only commonality we had at the time was that Sarah had a passion for real-world impact — and I really loved that."

A lawyer by trade, Mayleah is admitted as a solicitor in the NSW Supreme Court and High Court of Australia. She is now studying a Master of Environment and Sustainability at Monash University, exploring how corporate duties can require businesses to mitigate climate change — a career move she credits to a life-changing break on the Caribbean Island of Utila, Honduras.

Mayleah had been looking for a mentor in the environmental space for some time, but she hadn't found anyone that she really clicked with until she participated in the W100 Network's Mentors in Residence Program. That's how she met Sarah, a fellow Westpac Scholar.

Sarah is a 2019 Social Change Fellow and Founder of Champions Academy, 'a mentoring and development framework that helps people recognise their full potential and encourages them to apply it to a cause greater than the individual'. She is currently working on a new project to recycle agricultural plastic waste and use it to support and regenerate her local town in South Australia.

"As a mentor, Sarah can really empathise with where I'm at," says Mayleah. "She's able to see things from my perspective but also see when maybe I'm being a little bit dismissive of ideas or not being open to opportunities. She has got a really good way of navigating my hesitancy towards things and pushing back.

"My relationship with Sarah is one of the most important things that has come out of the scholarship, and I'm forever indebted to Westpac Scholars Trust for that relationship and also the broader connections within the W100 Network," she says. "Everybody just wants to support, promote, build up and show off the work that everybody else is doing. It's beautiful."



W100 COLLABORATION SUPPORTS SOCIAL CHANGE

Westpac Scholars Sarah Gun and Dr Tiffany De Sousa Machado are working together to provide an Inclusive Work Program for women and non-binary people who face complex barriers to employment. The nine-week program is facilitated by the GOGO Foundation, a charity Sarah was encouraged to set up during her Social Change Fellowship.

"The Inclusive Work Program is the first offering of the GOGO Foundation," says Sarah. "We ran our pilot program between April and June, 2021, and what became clearly evident was that these women were dealing with complex trauma.

"Family and domestic violence, experience of the child protection system, intergenerational poverty, incarceration... all these things. We needed someone, or an organisation, with a deep understanding who could help the women unpack their trauma. And that's where Tiffany came in."

Tiffany and Sarah originally met in 2017 when Sarah was undertaking her Westpac Social Change Fellowship and Tiffany was a Future Leader working on her social enterprise The Village Foundation, which provides education and support to new parents, employers and midwives to support mothers and prevent postpartum depression.

"I met Sarah and instantly knew that I loved her," says Tiffany.
"We definitely got along and there was a want for us to work
together somehow, and we knew the right thing would come
at the right time."

Now, Tiffany facilitates 'Wellbeing Wednesdays', a favourite and essential part of the Inclusive Work Program. "I come in on a Wednesday for half the day and we work through various topics around wellbeing, self-awareness and developing skills to be able to handle life's challenges," she says.

Feedback from the program's participants has been incredible. Sarah says, "we are building a stronger community through the work we're doing, not just in an economic sense but also because the empowerment ripples out into their families and their community."

On meeting through the W100 and forming a collaboration like this, Tiffany adds: "The W100 Network is such a rich melting pot of experience and personalities, that it becomes really easy to form those kinds of deep, multi-faceted, connected relationships and I'm really grateful for that."
