PROJECT BACKGROUND

In 2022 Westpac Scholars Trust embarked on its first long-term impact evaluation to discover how Westpac Scholars are helping shape a better future for Australia, in particular their contribution to building an inclusive Australia, a thriving technology sector, a sustainable future and enhancing Australia-Asia ties.

The Trust commissioned a study by market research agency Pollinate Australia and went through a six-stage research process to develop an evaluation framework. This involved consultation with scholars and stakeholders across several workshops and in-depth interviews as well as expert input from the Institute for International Education.

KEY OBJECTIVES OF THE IMPACT EVALUATION

Primary Objective

Assess Westpac Scholars Trust's effectiveness in achieving its ultimate goal

Demonstrate how Westpac Scholars are helping shape a better future for all Australians, in particular their contribution to building an inclusive Australia, enhancing Australia-Asia ties, a thriving technology sector and a sustainable future.

Secondary Objective

Provide evidence of Westpac Scholars Trust's value to society

Share the evaluation insights (and indicators) with scholarship providers and key stakeholders to demonstrate the impact of scholarships to society and grow investment in scholarship programs.

A SIX-STAGE ITERATIVE RESEARCH DESIGN

1. Plan

2. Develop **2.5-hour workshops**

3. Explore Qualitative research Conduct a series of triads (3 x people for one hour) and in-depth interviews (45 minutes) with scholars and adjacent stakeholders.

1.5-hour kick-off meeting

Identify existing knowledge and questions, align objectives and discuss project plans.

4. Validate

2 x 2-hr presentation & workshops

Present and workshop with stakeholders to optimise and agree an impact framework.

Workshops with key stakeholders to map a draft 'theory of change' and evaluation framework.

5. Assess **15-minute online survey among n=100** Online survey scholars and people who

work with/have worked with scholars.

6. Present and report

Present and report on the research findings to stakeholders and wider relevant audience. Presentation and report of the research findings to stakeholders and wider relevant audiences.

Scholar Impact Story Championing First Nations artists & communities

The Westpac Scholarship has had a significant influence on me. It came at a time when I was at a crossroads. I desperately needed access to the support and expertise.

Without this opportunity I may not have continued in my work, I was feeling so lost. The Westpac opportunity changed everything. Since the Fellowship, I have supported the startup of the APY Studio in Adelaide where 30+ First Nations artists across a diversity of language groups work daily.

I have supported the establishment of the Umoona Community Arts Centre for 60+ First Nations artists in Coober Pedy, Umoona, Oodnadatta, and surrounding homelands. Westpac has also supported us in securing our new headquarters in Adelaide and through partnerships with MinterEllison we've made significant progress in informing Government policy to support the protection of vulnerable artists and art centres.


Empowering migrants and refugees in Australia

When I applied for the Westpac Social Change Fellowship I was a first-time founder, with a fledgling early-stage social enterprise that had supported less than 100 people. We were struggling financially and I did not have the leadership skills to grow the organisation.

The Fellowship supported me and believed in my work. I was able to learn about social entrepreneurship at the best university in the world — Stanford Graduate School of Business, and met with many incredible social entrepreneurs, philanthropists and impact investors within Australia and across the globe. This gave me the credibility, skills, capability, and network to scale up our organisations to support migrant and refugee entrepreneurs. It also helped me deal with a very difficult funding and business environment created by the COVID-19 pandemic, lockdowns and the economic uncertainty. The support ensured that myself and Catalysr did not just survive the pandemic but was more anti-fragile and better off as a result.

Now Catalysr has supported 684 migrant and refugee entrepreneurs (who we call migrapreneurs) to learn about entrepreneurship and launch their own startups, and they are all a part of our collective goal to make Australia more inclusive. Since the Fellowship I have also become a founding member of the Global Refugee Entrepreneurship Network, which brings together incubators/accelerators, governments, corporates and academia from across the world to collaborate and share best practice on refugee entrepreneurship. I have been involved as a founding member of the Iti Rea Rea collective in New Zealand, which brought together many different settlement organisations across Auckland, a micro-finance organisation and also introduced Catalysr's work to create a new (first of its kind) collective of organisations to holistically support refugee entrepreneurs in New Zealand. And provided guidance to the Yunus Centre Team at Griffith University as they set up a new place-based incubator.

The scholarship was deeply transformational for me personally. What I am most proud of is finding clarity of purpose on what I want to focus on for the rest of my life. In the short-term that's supporting action on climate change migration and the integration of migrants and refugees. Long-term, I want to focus on creating global solutions to the impending climate migration crisis.

Leveraging university partnerships

"During my time at university, I was employed as part of their School of Science Student Ambassador program, with the idea of encouraging school students to study a STEM subject, specifically Computer Science and Cyber Security. As part of this, I developed a game to introduce students to the basic idea of encryption, by combining the concept of the Caesar Cipher with the game Hangman. As a result, I got to present to visiting school groups and at career events and do a presentation on the process of developing this application." Aidan Arbuckle, Young Technologist

"I'm most proud of my current role at the University of Sydney, inspiring the University to use its purchasing power for good and leading the response to modern slavery, Indigenous procurement and sustainability in its supply chains. My current role is thanks to the scholarship program, from my studies in international human rights, access to networks which was the catalyst for me to pursue human rights consulting, the leadership program to enable me to be an authentic and reflective leader, to working in the Westpac Scholars Trust and learning about social enterprises, and the incredible mentoring and endless support from the Westpac Scholars Trust team, W100 and fellow scholars."

New Ventures

"Since the Fellowship, I've started a home detox service. This builds on my work with Hello Sunday Morning which built a community supporting over 100,000 individuals. My new start-up Clean Slate Clinic focuses on GP-led home alcohol detox that has supported 150 people to date, with an ambition to support 10,000 people by 2025." Chris Raine, Social Change Fellow

"I'm the founder of Selfhive, a start-up providing easier management of everyday consumables and shopping lists for everyday people. The Westpac Scholars program supported my studies in being able to develop a product (via software development), and I would say, gave me the confidence and conviction to grow a new venture." "I'm currently developing new innovations in micromobility - such as a patent around solar powered electric scooters. This builds on the work I did with Unbound in education and social impact." Julian O'Shea, Social Change Fellow

Commercialisation

"As part of my Research Fellowship funded project we developed a method of detecting blood levels of platinum anticancer agents (used in ~50% of all chemotherapies) to help address toxicity issues in the clinic. This has been patent-protected and we are currently collecting clinical data to be able to license the technology to a major pharmaceutical company. So, it is not quite commercialised yet, but close." Professor Elizabeth New, Research Fellow

"I have initiated new research directions in biomedical engineering and renewable energy that have been internationally recognised. I founded a start-up company on nanotechnology. We are also creating a spray coating that can protect surfaces from virus and bacteria for an extended period." Professor Antonio Tricoli, Research Fellow

"I'm currently developing a tool on city adaptation to climate change, specifically heritage building adaptation to flooding. It is one of the first globally and the prototype has received strong interest."

Scholar Impact Story

Advancing Australia-Asia Ties

Being a Westpac Scholar was important at the start of my career in highlighting my unique capabilities around Australia's engagement with Asia. The role I was applying for was highly competitive and the team was small, but I was lucky enough that the employer had known of the reputation of the Westpac Scholars program which provided a well needed boost for myself.

Since joining the Investment NSW team I've had exposure to the highest levels of business and government in Australia and China. I am proud to have worked on some of the largest initiatives in the Australia-China relationship such as the NSW-Guangdong Joint Economic Meeting, where despite a freeze at the time at the national level, we were still able to hold a government-to-government meeting and pave the way for increased dialogue between the two countries.

Our team has directly assisted many NSW businesses expand and grow in mainland China, Hong Kong and Taiwan as well as engage with the business and government communities to increase collaboration. Out of many examples, a particularly big one is a \$40 million dollar deal in health that should see greater outcomes for the sector over the coming years and is a strong story of how collaboration can thrive between Australia and Asia.

Establishing nuance in trade and investment relations with Australia and China is important as there can be political overtones. When I joined there was an emphasis on using high-level data to describe economic conditions which sometimes lacked nuance and worked into decision making processes. However, I pushed back to ensure there was a greater depth of analytics and resources to describe economic conditions as part of our advice to government that has been adopted across other international market teams, such as our ASEAN team better understanding the massive increase in food and beverage exports to countries and how they can assist Australian businesses.

Scholar Impact Story

Reframing farm waste

Through the surplus merchandise left over from an event, I had the vision to recover local plastic waste and remanufacture it into higher value end products. This led to the development of Next Gen Waste Co — a Rural Circular Economy blueprint which can be replicated by any rural community.

A key priority of the business is to close the loop on agri/ aquaculture plastics and document the provenance and chain of custody of waste streams that we collect and process. We can then create a transparent record of the lifecycle of plastics that we recycle, remanufacture and put back into use.

We have attracted funding from Green Industries SA and the Federal Government through the 'Recycling Modernisation Fund: Regional & Remote'. The plastic recovery, processing and remanufacturing phase of our Pilot is about to roll out in Port Neill, South Australia. None of this would have been achieved if the Fellowship had not opened the doors of possibility to me. It enriched my journey as a thought-leader and change-maker by exposing me to critical learning opportunities, different perspectives and new networks. The experience I gained gave me the capacity and confidence to cut through the noise and deliver.

The Fellowship elevated me in a way that helped me to realise more fully what an individual is capable of when they have access to the right tools.

Creating jobs for Australians who need it most


I set up White Box Enterprises in 2019 as a result of my Fellowship learnings to systematically address the constraints that routinely confronted me when launching social enterprises: access to affordable space, access to catalytic capital and partnerships that help bring social enterprise into the mainstream fabric of employment in Australia.


With more than 15 years' experience in the social enterprise and not-for-profit sectors, I led a number of large-scale employment-focused social enterprise projects that have created meaningful work pathways for people facing barriers to employment. Since 2019, White Box Enterprises has enabled 400 new jobs, incubated three social enterprises, raised over \$21m for jobs creation projects, created four job hubs, hosted SEWF22 and is now leading Australia's first Federal Government trial measuring the effectiveness of social enterprise.


Methodology - Project Amplify (MT/LT).
